Who We Are

People's Action for National Integration - PANI is a social development organization currently working relentlessly in underdeveloped regions of northern states of India with focus in Uttar Pradesh, Himachal Pradesh, Rajasthan, and Bihar. It was founded in the year 1986 by a group of Gandhian social activists under the visionary leadership of Paras Bhai - a prominent and devoted Gandhian activist. The Gandhian philosophy of rural reconstruction and nation building by keeping people's actions in center was the key guiding principle behind the establishment of the organization. PANI was formally registered in 1989 as a not-for-profit entity under Societies Registration Act XXI, 1860. Its objective is to bring positive and sustainable change in lives of communities living in abject poverty and undue inequality. The organization has directly reached out to more than 2.5 million households in the last three decades through various program interventions.

What We Do

PANI is engaged at the grassroots level with women, children, youth, adolescent girls, small and marginal farmers, migrant workers to bring in changes in their life situations so that they can live a life with dignity.

Implementation is the core strength of PANI. It works to address the root causes of poverty and inequality through community-based interventions. PANI implements the programs with high level of commitment, inclusiveness; values and respects people's rights and tries its best to deliver high quality results in a manner accountable to stakeholders.

Shivendra Mani Tripathi (Member)



Project Highlights 2022-23

At the close of March 2023, PANI was implementing 14 projects spread over four states- Uttar Pradesh, Bihar, Rajasthan, and Himachal Pradesh. In addition to 14 projects that continue from previous year/s, 3 new projects were started with Indira Foundation, Hans Foundation, and MacArthur foundation as new partners. Two projects successfully concluded and were closed during the year.





Kanchan,
A Role Model for
Rural Women
Entrepreneurs

I'm Kanchan,

widow of the late Sri. Lally Prasad, aged around 43, residing in the village of Rasoolpur, I have been a dedicated member of Nari Sangh for the past six years. Throughout this period, my efforts within the Nari Sangh have been directed towards securina benefits from government schemes for our fellow members. However, circumstances took a challenging turn three years ago with the unfortunate demise of my husband. This phase made me realize that I was struggling to sustain my own livelihood and lacked the means to effectively advocate within government departments for entitlements due to financial constraints resulting from my husband's passing and the absence of a source of income.

During this period. I had the opportunity receive training from the PANI Sansthan to enhance my means of living. Inspired by this, I considered goat rearing as a viable option. Seeking guidance from the PANI's expert. I gathered crucial insights related to goat rearing. Putting these recommendations into practice, I initiated my venture with the acquisition of two goats in March 2021, Subsequently, in September, both goats gave birth to two kids, thus expanding our flock to four. After a span of 11 months, I successfully sold two goats for a sum of Rs 19500. With two goats and two kids remaining. our herd continued to grow. progression not only fortified my family's sustenance and education but also empowered me to approach government departments with confidence to secure benefits for Nari Sangh members

Empowering Adolescent Girls-EAG

Funding Partner: Azim Premji Foundation



Location: 184 Gram Panchayats of Ayodhya, Chitrakoot and Siddharthnagar districts, Uttar Pradesh

Objectives:

To empower highly vulnerable adolescent girls of the poorest and most marginalized families, to take control over their life situation and lead their life with dignity, choice, and decision.

Intervention:

- 1. Create a conducive environment for integrated development of adolescent girls through the medium of Gram Panchayat/village level Resource Centers (RC)
- 2. Develop capacity of adolescent girl leaders to access government entitlement schemes regarding health, nutrition, and education
- Develop capacity of alumni and adolescent girl leaders to act as catalyzing force to empower other younger girls
- 4. Develop perspective of parents, boys, and men to play a positive role in prevention of violence against women and girls
- 5. Link adolescent girls to skill development schemes and technical education centers
- 6. Collaborate with schools/colleges and various institution and experts for developing a system to students for career counselling
- 7. Create opportunities and guidance to adolescent girls for achieving career goal as per their choice and interest

Rural Changemakers (RCM)

Funding Partner: Azim Premji Foundation

Location: Tarun block, Ayodhya district, Uttar Pradesh



Objectives:

- Nurturing Employable/Independent Youth: The program seeks to create a model for nurturing rural youth girls into employable candidates, addressing the demand for highquality human resources in the development sector.
- Cultivating Rural Changemakers: The program aspires to mold a cohort of rural youth girls into Rural Changemakers, equipped with the skills and mindset to lead impactful changes in their communities.

Implementation: In the heart of Ayodhya district, Uttar Pradesh, the Rural Changemakers program, supported by the Azim Premji Foundation, has emerged as a beacon of hope and transformation. With a resolute commitment to nurturing and empowering adolescent girls, this initiative aims to create a cadre of Rural Changemakers who can drive positive change and contribute effectively to the development sector. The process followed in such way -

- 1. Selection of thematic: A critical aspect of the program is the careful selection of thematic areas.
- Structured Phases: The program is divided into four distinct phases: Basic, Main, Fundamental, and field Work. Each phase is designed to progressively enhance the participants' knowledge and capabilities, building them up as well-rounded Rural Changemakers.
- 3. Selection of Adolescents: The selection process is a rigorous journey that includes application, entrance exams, group discussions, and personal interviews. Out of the initial pool of 600+ applicants, 25 remarkable adolescent girls successfully demonstrated their dedication and potential to become Rural Changemakers.

On October 11, 2022, the program officially commenced with the participation of the selected cohort. This marked the beginning of their journey as trained and skilled social professionals ready to tackle the challenges of rural development. The program spans a duration of six months, focusing on comprehensive training and experiential learning for adolescent girls. The training combines classroom sessions and fieldwork, providing

participants with a holistic understanding of social development issues and practical skills to address them effectively. Participants engage in interactive sessions that cover essential topics, including communication skills, personality development, environmental conservation, gender equality, and understanding their rights. This foundational training equips them with a strong base, enabling them to comprehend the intricacies of community development. Following the classroom training, the participants embark on a two-month fieldwork and internship phase.

They collaborate with PANI Sansthan in various ongoing projects, such as community development, education, healthcare, sanitation, and sustainable livelihood initiatives. This hands-on experience allows them to translate their knowledge into practical solutions, enhancing their skills as Rural Changemakers.

The Rural Changemakers program is nurturing a new generation of Rural Changemakers who are committed to community development, gender equality, and sustainable practices. As these Rural Changemakers continue to evolve, they embody the essence through their determination, knowledge, and experience, they are poised to create openings in the sky of possibilities and illuminate the path towards a brighter and more empowered rural India.

SUCCESS STORY Breaking Gender Stereotypes through Determination

My name is Ranjan. I'm a science graduate (B.Sc.). I live in a small village named Baharpur near Ayodhya. I am the eldest among my four siblings. My father is a farmer, and my mother is a homemaker. My father owns a small piece of land. Due to limited produce from this land and almost no other income, getting two square meals a day was a struggle for us. My siblings and I struggled to get education due to limited resources. I was deeply worried witnessing the difficulties that my family faced. I made several attempts to find work, but being the eldest daughter, I have various responsibilities and therefore, I could not leave my village.

Once I shared my thoughts with an RCF (Resource Centre Facilitator) didi who is working in my village. She encouraged me to join the EAC (Empowering Adolescent Girls) program. That is when I learned about PANI Sansthan and their EAC program, which provides support to young girls to stand on their own feet, I decided to reach out to them.

She also told me about the RCM (Rural Changemakers) program. Social work had always resonated with me, and deep down, this thought had always been in my mind. When I got selected for the first batch of the RCM program, our lives started changing. At home, despite doing all the chores I was not receiving the respect and recognition that a family member should get. During the training, meeting new people and participating in discussions boosted my self-confidence. The training process helped me overcome the inner fears too. My grandmother always used to tell me that if I were a boy; I could have been a support to my father. This used to sadden me greatly because I also wanted to achieve something, I wanted to make something of my life and become a support to my parents.

After completing my training as a Rural Changemaker, I appeared for a job interview and got selected for the position of RCF (Resource Centre Facilitator). The atmosphere at my home turned joyous. Now, my grandmother praises me a lot. Hearing her changed words brings me immense happiness. Being the eldest daughter in the family, I am not only a support to my mother but also helping my father and contributing to my siblings' education and fees. Moreover, I am feeling changes happening within me with each passing day. I am feeling transformation brewing within me, a testament to the powerful impact of determination and hard work.

"Compared to earlier times, we are able to carry more goods to the market on our cart. As a result, we are able to sell more and our income has increased. In addition to contributing to the household income, we are capable to send our children to a good school for education. Our financial condition has also improved." - Santari.

"Earlier, we used to cook food on traditional Chullah in our kitchen, which was very harmful to our health due to smoke produced from burning of wood, cow dung cake, dry twigs, and leaves. - Coordinate and work closely with district and local health authorities, and other civil society organizations for awareness campaigns, and vaccination camps.

Intervention:

- · Activities for community mobilization.
- IPC, mother meetings, community meetings, ASHA/ASHA Sangini meetings, Teacher Orientation, ASHA- AWW- ANM Coordination meeting or (CAG) Community Action Group
- · Puppet show and E-rikshaw rallies.
- Support PVO/NGO efforts to strengthen national and regional immunization systems to achieve RI coverage of more than 75% and reduce the number of Zero dose children.
- · Support government in micro planning; train vaccinators in IPC skills.
- Ensure maximum coverage of eligible children through frontline workers, ex-CMCs supported vaccinators' team in high-risk areas.

Once, Moradabad was a hotspot for polio cases. There was a substantial proportion of "Zero-dose" children. Parents were hesitant towards polio vaccination and resisted attempts to administer polio drops due to myths and misconceptions in the community. PANI, in partnership with UNICEF, WHO and health department did need based planning to combat the prevailing challenges. The project has made immense progress in turning around the situation.

Develop a service pathway using a stepped care model for mental health care in the community.


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Implementation:







