



About PANI



PANI is a social development organization working relentlessly in underdeveloped regions of northern states of India. It was founded in the year 1986 by a group of Gandhian social activists under the visionary leadership of Paras Bhai - a prominent and devoted Gandhian activist. The Gandhian philosophy of rural reconstruction and nation building by keeping people's actions in center was the key guiding principle behind the establishment of the organization. PANI was formally registered in 1989 as a not-for-profit entity under Societies Registration Act XXI, 1860. Its objective is to bring positive and sustainable change in the lives of communities living in abject poverty and undue inequality. The organization has directly reached out to more than 2.5 million households in the last more than three decades through various program interventions.

PANI designs and implements projects under its thematic focus areas supported by diverse range of funding organizations - Indian philanthropies, foundations, corporate CSR, and foreign funding organizations. The thematic areas of PANI's work are –



Snapshot of **PROJECTS**

PANI was active in 38 districts in 2023-24, implementing 27 projects funded by 18 partners. During the year six projects successfully concluded after handover of the activities to the local community and volunteers who had been trained and groomed to keep the project activities alive even after PANI's exit from those locations. At the same time, four new projects started in 2023-24. The number of live projects under implementation by PANI at the close of March 2024 was 25.

Two new partners, DCM Shriram Foundation and RESONANCE (USAID/PepsiCo GDA), extended their funding support for PANI's projects in the thematic areas of Gender & Governance, and NRM & Climate Change.



- EAG program expanded to Pahari (Chitrakoot) and Khuniyaon (Siddharthnagar).
- 7,208 AGs received IFA tablets; 9,671 got de-worming tablets via VHND and Health Wellness Centers.
- 540 drop-out AGs resumed education.
- 189 girls trained in Customer Care, Retail, GDA, and Electricals.
- 231 AGs employed post-training this year; total 684 placed.
- 3 girls cleared competitive exams, joining the merchant navy, Agniveer scheme, and Delhi police.
- Cricket team finished 3rd in 31st Junior National Tennis Ball Championship; AGs also excelled in kabaddi and athletics at district/state levels.

Success Story

Seema Devi (37) and her husband Dhani Ram (42), smallholder farmers from Gram Panchayat Manigadha in Rehra Bazar Block, Balrampur District, face the challenge of sustaining their family of six. Dhani Ram migrates for six months each year to work as a daily wage laborer. Seema, a member of Mahila Kisan Sangthan (MKS), learned best practices and crop-specific techniques from videos provided by the project team. She applied these techniques to potato cultivation on 0.25 acres, earning an additional ₹29,000 for her family. Now, Seema trains other women in her village to boost productivity and reduce costs.

- Provided 1,500 households with plastic crates and grain storage containers to reduce post-harvest losses.
- Prepared annual food security plans for 3,750 households.
- Distributed high-yield wheat seeds to 2,000 small and marginal farmers.
- Conducted nutrition behavior training for 3,750 women.
- Supplied vegetable seeds to 3,750 households for kitchen gardens.
- Distributed IEC materials to enhance awareness among Anganwadi workers/helpers.
- Provided cookware and utensils for mid-day meals in 25 primary schools.
- Promoted healthy dietary practices through wall paintings in 25 GPs for different age groups, pregnant and lactating women, and children.

Success Story

Kunni Devi lives in a mud house with her family of six. Their small yield from 10 biswa of land and 20 biswa of sharecropped land barely sustains them. At a community meeting, she shared how moisture and rodents were damaging her stored grain—a common issue for many poor households. After receiving training on safe grain storage, she started using bakhari, which significantly improved her family's food security. Additionally, Kunni Devi began growing vegetables like spinach, fenugreek, radish, and coriander on her farm.

- Training sessions (attended by more than 1,500 community members, primarily women and girls):
 - on garbage management- 30batches
 - women and adolescent girls on MHM- 30 batches
- Construction of garbage management structures- 50 units
- Setting-up community managed SanNap depot-30 units
- Formation of water user group for maintenance and management of Jal-Minar, community bathroom and garbage management structures in each project village
- Village Health Sanitation & Nutrition Committee (VHSNC) formed/activated in all Panchayats
- 20 solar -powered water stations (5,000 liters capacity each) with water filter constructed and handed over to community.
- 34 community bathrooms constructed and handed over to community.
- 500 copies of a flipbook on WASH Behavior Change Communication distributed among community influencers and stakeholders.

Case Study

For octogenarian Parvati Devi of Chauferwa in Achakapur Gram Panchayat, access to clean drinking water was a daily challenge. She had to carry potable water from the only source, which is a few hundred meters away or depend on her neighbors. Her husband died a few years ago and her children are all married and live in other towns. Similarly, for Nanki Devi of Semaura Gram Panchayat, absence of a bathroom in her house was a big worry as her grand daughter is 19 years old and had to take bath early in the morning in the dark as the only cover was a piece of her mother's old sari which she hung on clothesline while she bathed.

Such issues are brought up by the project members during community meetings and are verified and analyzed by the project team on various parameters. A Jal-Minar in Achakapur and a community bathroom were constructed under the project. Parvatii Devi and Nanki Devi are happy to have access to clean drinking water and a bathroom respectively. Currently, 75 poor households in Chauferwa take drinking water from the Jal-Minar and more than 20 families use the community bathroom in Semaura. For these households these are not only means to access the basic necessities, but also a great benefit in reducing drudgery, better health and hygiene, and safety of women and girls.

- Counselling center established for providing counselling support to severe cases by experts.
- Mental Health Literacy sessions conducted for youth, which saw participation from 30,883 youth (17-24 years age bracket).
- 62 team member received 22 day's training on first responder care and 6 sessions on intervention.
- 1,819 youth screened with the help of a mobile application. 1,703 youth scored within the normal range, while 71 were found to have mild anxiety, 29 with moderate anxiety, and 16 had severe anxiety.
- · First responder care provided to 32 youths.
- MoU for referral with Medical College, Ayodhya to develop referral pathways, which will lead to a formal referral system with college.
- Physical points have been established in easily accessible locations where youth and others seeking help and support can come and talk to PSWs in person.

- Two FRCs have been set up in the project area for the availability of quality agricultural inputs, equipment's.
- Total of 21 ponds are renovated through MGNREGS all renovation is completed and also reflected on MGNREGS portal these ponds create water harvesting potential of thousand liters in single filling.
- KYC of 10,809 farmers was completed through the camp and meeting with beneficiary at gram panchayat level with the help of Technical assistant (TA) agriculture Department.

Success Story

Qasim Siddiqui, a farmer in Mahui Nankar panchayat, Khesarha block, Siddharthnagar, owns two hectares of land where he grows vegetables and fruits. Until recently, he relied on traditional irrigation methods, which were costly, labor-intensive, and led to water wastage and crop damage from over-irrigation.

During a community meeting organized by the project team, Qasim learned about micro-irrigation techniques and government subsidies. With the team's help, he applied for a drip irrigation system for two acres through the district horticulture department. The system was installed within days, costing ₹294,000, of which Qasim paid only ₹29,400. Now, he enjoys reduced water usage, cost savings, and healthier crops.




- 25 adolescent girls of the 2nd batch have successfully completed the program and have been awarded a certificate

- The participants of the current batch went for fieldwork to various organizations or to one of the projects implemented by PANI.
